Carthon W. Bryant was born January 14, 1938 in Chicago, Illinois to Oscar and Johnetta Bryant.

Carthon accepted Christ in his life at an early age. He attended Manley High School and Washburn Culinary School.

After finishing school, Carthon served four years in the Armed Forces. He began his working career at the Chicago Transit Authority (CTA), where he met his lovely wife, Mary. He later worked for Schulze Bakery and Yellow Freight.

Carthon operated several successful businesses, a hot dog stand; he was one of the first African Americans to contract with the City of Chicago with Waste Management; and CW Transportation, a business that helped numerous people who needed to get to and from their medical appointments.

On October 25, 2013, Carthon fell asleep in death. He was preceded in death by his parents, Oscar and Johnetta Bryant.
